- Penquis is a federal Community Action Agency and offers over 50 programs. This presentation focused on those experiencing homelessness, but they do generally support folks who are in need and often close to homelessness.
- Emergency Rental Assistance program (ERA)
  - Funded through Department of Treasury. Meant to keep people housed.
  - Lack of affordable housing is a significant barrier. Often folks face rent increases or other factors that leave them with no place to go.
  - Capacity of hotels is challenging but they've been good partners. There are currently 148 applicants in Bangor hotels. Expect some will stop accepting ERA vouchers due to tourism season.
  - People can qualify for up to 18 months, concern is what happens after that period, especially since there is a lack of affordable housing.
  - A total of 3,340 folks in Bangor are being assisted by this program.
- Rental counseling – one-on-one counseling meant to help folks stay where they are and work through issues with their landlord.
- Penquis builds affordable housing for older Mainers and low-income eligible applicants.
  - In Bangor alone, there are 154 units in Bangor, 43 vouchers. All together they have 385 units with different kinds of vouchers.
  - They cannot create units fast enough.
- Works closely with the City of Bangor and many other agencies.
- Foreclosure counseling is another service offered, in addition to other forms of assistance. There is very little assistance for homeowners, as there is little funding for it.
- Residential services for individuals with behavioral health diagnosis.
- In response to a question about the resources coming into Bangor and potential fragmentation, Ms. Hay responded that there is great leadership in Bangor, Built for Zero is meant to help address some of the fragmentation, but there are competing interests and resources. Ms. Hay would like to see everyone coming together to discuss and help address the issues facing our area. She stated that housing is a great need.
